I would like to thank you all for attending our Parent Consultation sessions earlier in the week. I know you found them to be informative and as a parent, I know it always delightful to share your child's learning and see their books. I am sure you are very impressed with the quantity of work that has already been produced and the high quality marking which the children respond to. The Class Dojo reports were very well received and it really does provide you with a summary of your child's typical learning behaviours at school. If we can develop these Secrets of Success right from the onset, then not only will children's experience at school be enjoyable but they will achieve our vision for each and every child: *"To be successful both personally and academically"*.



Please remember that nobody is perfect and we do all make mistakes. Our expectation is for all children to have a record of 97% positive behaviour or above. Should your child's behaviour fall below this expectation, it is monitored closely by senior leaders and if improvement isn't secured, you will be invited to a meeting to discuss the issues further.

We know that the opportunity to participate in competitive events is something we need to develop further. This year we have signed up to numerous events throughout the year covering a range of sports. Obviously we are extremely limited by our facilities, as training on our very small, sloping playground is a challenge. Nevertheless last night we entered a football tournament that was held at Chesterton High School. Astrophysics Visit to Keele University



Last week class 4 were privileged to participate in an Astrophysics workshop at Keele University arranged by Dr Taylor (a parent from our school). It was a wonderful opportunity for them to visit the university and understand the role of Scientists there. During the morning, the children were able to find out more about the Earth and our Solar System. They enjoyed looking at different types of telescopes and finding out about the role of Keele Observatory, in exploring what may lie beyond the planet earth. The whole morning was thoroughly enjoyable and has certainly helped to inspire our children as Scientists. Many of the children stated at the end of the session, when they were giving feedback to the lecturers that they would love to study Science at Keele and work at the observatory. Viking Day



On Thursday class 3 were visited by a Viking... It began with a siege in the library! The children were very engaged from the off, although a little on their guard! The children began their learning with the Viking warrior. They learnt about the different weapons that the warriors used, as well as some other features of the weapon. The sword was the only weapon that had just one purpose (killing). The others could be used for hunting. The children then had the opportunity to examine the different items... and some of them were very heavy! The children had the chance to go outside and apply their understanding and safety skills about fire. They found out how the Vikings used fire, as well as the three things that all fires need.

The end of the day finished with how the Vikings dealt with death, from funerals to checking to making sure the chief was dead. They looked at the roles of slaves in society, too. These people would not have the chance to go to Asgard (Viking heaven) unless they volunteered themselves as a sacrifice when a chief died. They would go with the chief to the afterlife along with many important objects (aside from the swords and helmets as only the king took that).
